American Psychological Association. Division 17 - Society of Counseling Psychology. The Division brings together psychologists, students, and professional affiliates who are dedicated to promoting education and training, scientific investigation, practice, and diversity and public interest in professional psychology. The Division contains sections representing Counseling Health Psychology; Independent Practice; Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual Awareness; Racial and Ethnic Diversity; Vocational Psychology; Advancement of Women; and Prevention. Other Special Interest Groups also exist. Members must be currently involved in teaching of, research in, or practice in counseling psychology. Six issues of the journal *The Counseling Psychologist* and three issues of the *Division 17 Newsletter* are sent to members each year. Student members are welcome to affiliate with Division 17 through membership in the Student Affiliate Group (SAG). The division recognizes a diversity of women's experiences which result from a variety of factors, including ethnicity, culture, language, socioeconomic status, age, and sexual orientation. The division promotes feminist research,

theories, education, and practice toward understanding and improving the lives of girls and women in all their diversities; encourages scholarship on the social construction of gender relations across multicultural contexts; applies its scholarship to transforming the knowledge base of psychology; advocates action toward public policies that advance equality and social justice; and seeks to empower women in community, national, and global leadership. We welcome student members and affiliates. Members are provided two publications: *Psychology of Women Quarterly*, which is a journal of research, theory, and reviews, and the *Psychology of Women Newsletter*.
